## Global Event Pogopalooza to Be Held Here

This year, Pogopalooza—the biggest pogo event in the world—will be in Wilkinsburg, the new home of Xpogo's headquarters. The event on July 21-22 will attract all the top pogoers to compete for cash prizes on four categories.

"This will be the fourth time we are holding it in the Pittsburgh area and are looking to anchor it here as this is our home and we want to put our biggest event of the year here," said Will Weiner the CEO of Xpogo.

"It goes back 15 years to pretty humble beginnings, the first one occurring at a church parking lot in Nebraska with a handful of people on spring pogo sticks. Since then we've held the event around the world: Jacksonville, Orange County California, Philadelphia, New York City and Sweden."



The competition categories are the high jump, the best trick, and two that are run-based

In the high jump, athletes compete to see who can clear the highest height on a pogo stick. Weiner said that it is likely the audience will see them challenging for a Guinness world record, the previous record was 11' 1" (which was actually set last year

in Wilkinsburg at Community Forge).

The best trick competition is where athletes try to perform never before landed, high difficulty tricks.

In the two run based competitions, Xpogo will set up a pogo park with

boxes of varying heights, slants, rails to grind, etc. "The athletes will string together 'runs' of tricks that are judged on their difficulty, style and creativity," explained Weiner.

The first run based competition is called Tech, "old school" extreme pogo. The athletes can only use spring based sticks. The second is called Big Air, where athletes use special air powered pogo sticks that let them do .huge tricks several feet in the air, flips on and off of obstacles, etc.

In addition to the competitions, there is a 'free jump area'. Xpogo will have many pogo sticks of different sizes available, from beginner kids, to the large air powered ones and everything in between to try. Food vendors will attend the event.

Xpogo really wants Wilkinsburg residents to represent. "All in all this is a competition, but it's also a celebration of the sport of pogo and the community we are building around it here, so we really love people to come out and see the amazing stunts the athletes do, but additionally want them to participate in free jump, see their neighbors, etc." said Weiner.

For some competitors, this will be their first Pogopalooza they may have met

## Reclaiming Vacant Lots in the Borough

Of the buildings currently standing in Wilkinsburg, nearly one in five are vacant. Properties that are abandoned or vacant for long periods of time have significant negative effects on a community, including increased blight, increased fire risk, decreased property values, and more.

Many municipalities throughout the country are struggling with how to reduce the number of blighted and abandoned properties; Allegheny County is helping take a proactive approach toward a solution.

If you own a property and wish to expand it, you can apply for the Allegheny County Vacant Property Recovery Program. This allows a resident to acquire and rehabilitate an adjacent property at a significantly reduced cost.

The program has the benefit of

improving the community by reducing the number of vacant properties, as well as improving the size and quality of the individual's property. No good-faith deposit is required at the time of application.

The program has a variable pricing structure depending on the type of property and the plan for it. For instance, purchasing a vacant lot to be included as a side yard will cost less than demolishing a blighted structure, which will cost less than rehabilitating a blighted structure.

In most cases parcel fees will be either discounted or waived entirely.

## Wilkinsburg's Plan to Reconfigure Schools for 2018-19

On April 30, Superintendent Linda Iverson sent a letter to the school district announcing that the Board of Directors had approved a reconfiguration of the schools.

The reconfiguration will create a K-2 Primary School at Kelly Elementary and a grades 3-6 Intermediate School at Turner Elementary for the coming 2018-2019 school year.

"The goal in creating these new grade-level schools was to create better environments—academically, socially, and emotionally—for students to learn and grow," wrote Dr. Iverson.

By reconfiguring the schools, classroom space will be freed to offer additional programming to students, management of future student enrollment will be easier, the small-class-size initiative will be preserved, the size of schools will be more balanced, wrap-around care service for students will be provided, all 4-6 graders will have the opportunity to take chorus and band, and counseling services for students will be expanded.

"This past year, we have been completing an instructional program review to align curriculum across grades and create a cohesive educational pathway as students move through our buildings," wrote Iverson. "We are also establishing grade level standards and standard based report cards for implementation next year.

"Establishment of grade level expectations assures students are prepared for the next level of learning, and that all students are provided the same rigorous and relevant learning opportunities throughout the District."

Iverson said they are doing everything they can to assure a smooth transition for students, families, and staff. We are currently planning, reviewing, evaluating and considering every aspect of student needs, educational priorities, and what the physical transition of our district will look like and more communication will follow.

## Frequently Asked Questions with Answers from the School District

### Why Now?

The conversation about the reconfiguration started in March during the initial budget discussions. During this time we discussed the seven teacher retirements that we were made aware of in January. The discussion was geared around how we take advantage of repurposing the dollars from the teacher retirements. Without repurposing these funds, we would have to increase cost to keep class sizes small.

Additionally, we know that by increasing cost in some areas of our operations may result in a larger savings to the district by bringing back the charter school students.

### Why was the district reconfiguration a secret?

There was no secret. On Tuesday, April 24, 2018, the Board of Directors at its regular meeting accepted my recommendation and voted and approved the reconfiguration of the schools in our District into K-2 Primary School at Kelly Elementary and a grade 3-6 Intermediate School at Turner Elementary, effective the 2018-2019 school year. The goal in creating these new grade-level schools was to create better environments - academically, socially, and emotionally - for students to learn and grow.

### Will the names of the schools change?

Yes- the names of the schools will be officially changed to Kelly Primary School and Turner Intermediate School.

### What is the rationale to reconfigure the district?

By reconfiguring our schools, Kelly and Turner schools will have the classroom space required to offer additional programming to our students. In addition, reconfiguring our schools allows us to improve our school district in many other ways. For example, we will be able to better manage future student enrollment, preserve our successful small-class-size initiative, balance the size of schools, provide wraparound care service for students, give 4-6 graders the opportunity to take chorus and band and expand our instrumental music program, counseling services for students and implement a Spanish Immersion Program.

### How will the reconfiguration impact the construction of Turner?

No impact.

### What will class sizes be?

The relationship between class size and student achievement has long been the subject of debate. Research indicates that students certainly benefit, but that small classes are not the "magic bullet" and need to be augmented by quality teaching. Research suggests that class sizes between 15 and 20 students to have positive effects on learning. Wilkinsburg Collective Bargaining Agreement sets guidelines for K-3 at 25 and 4-6 classrooms up to 30 students.

### What will the Primary and Intermediate School day hours be?

Planning for the needs of students and families is a primary concern. Bussing plans will allow for siblings to be transported together with drop off at both schools in sequence; i.e., Primary at 7:40 a.m., Intermediate at 7:47. Students will be served breakfast upon arrival. Dismissal will function in reverse with the Intermediate students picked up first, then Primary.

### How will the start times affect the busing to and from Westinghouse?

Start times will not affect the busing to and from Westinghouse.

### What behavior will be expected of my child on the bus?

...The district has adopted three district-wide discipline expectations that address the entire school, the classroom, and areas outside of the classroom such as the hallways, restrooms, cafeteria, busses and offices. They are Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Safe. School buses are considered an extension of the classroom and students are expected to conduct themselves accordingly. Students who are transported on district-contracted school buses shall comply with the Student Code of Conduct. Bus transportation is a privilege not a right.

### When will students receive bus information?

Students will receive their information by August 17th whether they are a student walker, a bus student, bus stop, bus arrival and departure time. We are working to get this information to parents even earlier.

### Will all students regardless of their proximity to the schools be bused?

No, only students who live further than 1 mile from the school will receive busing. All others will be considered walkers. However, the district will take into consideration students who live near hazardous roads and consider exceptions where bus transportation is in the best interest of the safety of the student.

other pogoers online. They will be coming from across the United States as well as from international locations, such as Canada, France and Russia.

Weiner says that even the average person can get involved in the sport of pogoing: "The simplest way is to start pogoing on a spring stick. That is how all of our athletes began, and there are still lots of cool tricks someone can challenge themselves with on one of those sticks."

He added that Xpogo plans to expand community engagement later this summer, possibly holding open pogo "jams" every week or two at Community Forge where people of all skill levels can meet up and bounce

Xpogo has a stunt team that travels across the globe, doing extreme pogo demos, performing at professional sport events and other festivals and corporate events.

Recently, some of their athletes finished filming a series called "The Pogo Adventure," which follows some of the best pogoers in the world going on a road trip. Xpogo athletes will be making some television appearances, including *Good Morning America*, *Americas Got Talent*, and *Dude Perfect*.

Xpogo desires to work with the Wilkinsburg community. They've been working with afterschool at the Community Forge to run pogo sessions with students. They are also working with the Wilkinsburg Parks Department to have clinics this summer.

Long-term plans include expanding Hunter Park to include an extreme sports section where youth who are interested in pogo

and other sports can play and hone skills.

Pogopalooza will be webcast on our Youtube channel of 65,000+ subscribers," said Weiner." We'll be letting them all know Wilkinsburg is where we've made our home. ...I would love it if one day a youth we work with in one of our clinics in Wilkinsburg could join the stunt team and take part in some of the opportunities we get to travel the world and compete at Pogopalooza."
